

QUARTERLY UPDATE (OCTOBER TO DECEMBER 2025)

This report provides updates on the progress of GEC's activities for the fourth quarter (Q4) of 2025: October to December 2025.

FOREST AND COASTAL PROGRAMME

Ecosystem Restoration Success

- GEC successfully planted a total of 28,538 trees across degraded sites in three ecosystems: mangroves in Kedah, Perak, Selangor and Johor, peatlands in Selangor and Johor, and inland forests in Selangor, Melaka and Johor, while monitoring and inspection visits were carried out at 15 canal block construction sites in Johor and Selangor to assess the current condition and functionality of the structures, including evaluations of their structural integrity and the identification of corrective measures to enhance water flow regulation and hydrological management.



Environmental Education and Programmes

- Two district-level Peatland Forest Ranger (PFR) school carnivals were conducted in collaboration with Prosper Capital Holdings Sdn Bhd, the Selangor Education Department and the respective District Education Offices to foster environmental awareness and stewardship, which was participated by 349 individuals – students and teachers from four schools. The Kuala Langat carnival involved three indigenous primary schools, while the Hulu Selangor carnival involved students from one national primary school.
- On Oct 11, GEC partnered with the ESG Programme under the Human Capability Development Programme (HCDP) to facilitate an interactive knowledge-sharing session that strengthened participants' understanding of the ecological importance of mangrove ecosystems while highlighting ongoing conservation efforts in the Gunung Arong Forest Reserve, particularly in peatland hydrological management, fire prevention and ecosystem restoration.
- Two major environmental education programmes were conducted between October and December 2025, engaging 353 participants to promote hands-on learning on wetland and forest ecosystems and to strengthen collaboration between academic institutions and conservation sites. The RMIT's Selangor Wetland Study Tour was held from Oct 28 to Nov 20 at RMFR, BBEFR and KDH, involved 21 participants. This was followed by Monash University's programme, conducted in two blocks from Nov 24–26 (152 students and 16 staff) and from Dec 8–10 (150 students and 14 staff) at CoSPeC and TCIC.





Armada Berhad, OCBC, YSD-UKM Chairs, MYCCC, UUM Model United Nations Club and the Ecoroof project and YSD-SEPAKAT initiatives, reaching a total of 318 participants through in-person and online engagements.

- On Oct 23, GEC participated in the Johor State-level International Day of Forests 2025 celebration, which provided a platform to promote sustainable forest management and highlight the critical role of forests in supporting biodiversity, climate regulation and ecosystem resilience.

- During the quarter, GEC was invited to deliver six sustainability talks on community-based mangrove conservation and climate change to corporate, academic, civil society and community audiences under the Bumi

Community-based Initiatives

- From Oct 26 to 31, GEC, in collaboration with Aramco Asia Singapore (AAS), hosted the Thai Sea Watch Association (TSWA) for an intensive peer-learning and capacity-building programme, facilitating cross-border knowledge exchange between Malaysian community groups and TSWA on mangrove rehabilitation, nursery management and biodiversity monitoring in Sungai Petani (Kedah) and Kuala Gula (Perak).



- From Nov 10 to 14, GEC, in collaboration with Aramco Asia Singapore and Aramco Malaysia, facilitated Yayasan Gambut (YG) peer learning visit to Pulau Tanjung Surat and Parit Kassim, Johor, engaging 25 Indonesian participants. This programme aimed to strengthen community-based organisation management, mangrove conservation skills and promote sustainable livelihoods through experiential learning and cross-community knowledge exchange.
- In November, GEC in collaboration with Sahabat Hutan Bakau Pulau Tanjung Surat (SHBPTS), established a tree nursery to support the Vita Tenggara ecosystem restoration, providing 1,500-2,000 healthy forest fruit tree seedlings for phased replanting and habitat rehabilitation.
- In November, Leader Energy and GEC organised a peer learning visit for 13 members of Sahabat Hutan Bakau Kampung Taman Nilam (SHBKTN) to Kuala Gula. Participants gained expertise in nursery operations, financial management, and sustainable livelihoods—including mud crab farming. This exchange strengthened community capacity for mangrove conservation and equipped SHBKTN with adaptable, community-led economic models.
- GEC supported mangrove communities in the production of two mangrove-based products such as Coolega and Mangroovist, aiming to diversify product offerings and sustain community livelihoods.
- Sixteen (16) programmes including IVTP visits, programmes and exhibitions were facilitated by SGAT at TCIC and in other locations. For this quarter, the IVTP generated total sales valued at RM 38,236 from monthly allowances, services provided and the sales of community products, handicrafts, and vegetables.

Conservation Efforts and Partnership

- On Oct 14, GEC, together with TH Plantation, Pejabat Hutan Daerah PHD Johor Tengah and the KomPAS community, conducted a tree planting and monitoring activity at FC103, GAFR, planting 250 trees and visiting previous plots to strengthen multi-stakeholder collaboration and support long-term forest restoration.
- On Dec 12, GEC partnered with the Rotary Club of Pontian to conduct a site assessment of a 1-hectare degraded mangrove forest in Parit Rambah, Pontian, evaluating conditions and accessibility to plan future rehabilitation activities.
- During this quarter, GEC participated as an exhibitor at public events, including the Tapir Trails conservation campaign in Kuala Lumpur and the National-Level International Mangrove Forest Conservation Day celebration in Tumpat, Kelantan, showcasing mangrove exhibits and selling mangrove-based products. These engagements aimed to promote public awareness of environmental conservation and biodiversity protection, reaching approximately 1,000 visitors.

Policies and Guidelines

- GEC was appointed as the technical consultant for the development of Selangor's State Action Plan for Peatlands by Selangor State Forestry Department and Sustainable Management of Peatland Ecosystems in Malaysia (SMPEM)-Selangor, facilitating partnerships with over 35 government and private stakeholders to develop viable management actions via multi-agency approach. In line with this initiative, a series of technical meetings were held with key agencies, including the Department of Wildlife and National Parks (PERHILITAN), Malaysian Meteorological Department (METMalaysia) and Department of Agriculture Malaysia to support data collection and planning.
- GEC successfully completed and submitted the Proposed Plan Permanent Forest Reserve Management for Kuala Gula 2026–2030 to the Perak State Forestry Department to guide the planning and management of this 201 ha of mangrove ecosystem. The plan was subsequently endorsed by the Perak State Forestry Department on Dec 5.



RIVER CARE PROGRAMME

W.A.T.E.R Project

Under the Water Project funded by the SPARK Foundation, GEC organised a clean-up activity in December at the Sungei Way Community River Information Centre, Desa Mentari, as part of its ongoing community engagement and WATER Stewardship initiatives. The activity involved students from the University of Cyberjaya together with three local community members, reflecting a collaborative approach between academic institutions and the local community. Activities conducted included rubbish collection, area clean-up, and tree planting to enhance the surrounding environment. Meanwhile, the latest community group was established in Bestari Jaya, Kuala Selangor (KRT Taman Suria), marking a significant step in strengthening local participation in environmental stewardship. As part of ongoing efforts to support community-led, environment-based initiatives, the Taman Suria community carried out a tree planting activity on 6 December to rehabilitate and beautify the riverbank stretch. In addition to tree planting, pollinator-friendly plants were introduced around the Taman to enhance local biodiversity, support pollinators such as bees and butterflies, and contribute to a healthier riverbank ecosystem.

Sg Kayu Ara River Protection Project

On Nov 5, a one-day SMART Ranger Training for selected schools in the Sungai Kayu Ara Catchment was successfully conducted at SK Damansara Utama, bringing together 54 participants comprising 40 students and 14 teachers from seven (7) schools. Organised by the GEC and funded by OSK Foundation, with the approval and support of the



Selangor State Education Department and PPD Petaling, the training formed part of the ongoing SMART Ranger Programme and aimed to enhance awareness and practical skills in holistic solid waste and resource management through theory and hands-on skill learning.

SER-Microsoft Ecological Restoration Project, Cyberjaya

In December, GEC organised a wetland planting volunteering event at Cyberjaya Lake Garden. Participants were involved in planting wetland and pollinator plants to support park biodiversity and strengthen the lake's natural filtration functions, alongside cleaning up the project nursery area. The programme also included a guided walk around the park, where participants learned about the importance of protecting water bodies and how nature-based solutions, such as wetland cells and biofilters, play a vital role in improving water quality and enhancing ecosystem resilience.



Empowering Communities to Enhance Livelihood and Food Security – Yayasan Hasanah

Under the project funded by Yayasan Hasanah and the Ministry of Finance, the GEC successfully organised several initiatives during this period to support community-based ecotourism and capacity building.

The Program Santai Sungai at Kayuh D'Tonggang Series 3, held from Oct 11–12, involved 19 participants from government agencies, educational institutions, and Orang Asli communities across Perak, featuring activities such as trail walks, traditional blowpipe practice, trapping and weaving demonstrations, river monitoring practices at Sungai Senooi, a cultural sewang night, bird-watching, and visits to community galleries.



From Oct 25–26, 20 participants from government agencies, tourism operators, local communities, students, and Orang Asli groups also joined the RPS Ulu Kinta Community-Based Ecotourism Programme, which strengthened connections between the Orang Asli communities and external stakeholders through activities at Kayuh D'Tonggang (Chalet) and Jok Bepihoy Mabeg @ Kampung Makmur (Denai Alam Sungai), fostering collaboration for sustainable ecotourism development.



On Nov 7, a Capacity Building and Community-based Business Plan Training was held for 20 participants from Kampung Kenang, led by appointed business experts from Universiti Malaysia Kelantan (UMK), enhancing their skills in financial management, ecotourism package development, and promotional strategies, with pre- and post-training surveys conducted to measure understanding and programme impact.

Enhancing Local Action and Community Participation in Disaster Preparedness and Response

Under the project Enhancing Local Action and Community Participation in Disaster Preparedness and Response, funded by Yayasan PETRONAS (YP), the focus during this period was on peer-to-peer sharing of outcomes from community-led flood preparedness initiatives across selected states. Four sessions were successfully conducted in October in Perak (37 participants), Negeri Sembilan (50), Federal Territory (70) and Selangor (37).



The participants included multistakeholder representatives from community groups, government agencies, disaster and emergency services authorities, local councils and YP.

Communities from selected districts in these states shared outcomes of their initiatives and handed their flood map and response plan to the respective district office. Among the prevailing local Issues pertinent to particular communities that were highlighted here included: the need for more sustained and cohesive inter-agency and community engagement as well as youth involvement to strengthen flood resilience, demarcate safe roads routes to their nearest evacuation centres, with emphasis on continued collaboration, improved and well-maintained infrastructure, stronger preparedness, and wider community awareness for long-term flood resilience. The need to address problems from blocked culverts, poor waste management, limited emergency access and resources, rapid and unplanned development, and, lack of fair relief distribution, as well as a centralised database for high-risk families.



PEATLAND PROGRAMME

Pahang

GEC was engaged by Pahang Government through Pahang State Forestry Department and the SMPPEM Project, for the development of the State Action Plan for Peatland (SAPP) Pahang and organised an inception and follow-up meeting with the stakeholders. In addition, GEC had a joint CSR event of tree planting and food baskets dissemination with Bunge Lodgers Crocklaan and IOI Bukit Leelau Estate. GEC also facilitated a meeting between YP Plantation Holdings and the Pahang State Forestry Department addressing hydrological issue within the YPPH-GEC Recovery Project Area. GEC also collaborated in the Environmental Carnival hosted by Department of Environment (DOE) and Enggang (Agriculture) Sdn Bhd, as well as Health and Sustainability Festival hosted by International Islamic University Malaysia (IIUM). GEC received a certificate of appreciation from Pahang State Government for the contribution for biodiversity survey and research in the Southeast Pahang Peatland Landscape (SEPPL).



GEC continued to support Orang Asli community welfare through the provision of solar facilities, water filters, and food baskets, and worked with Department of Agriculture to develop vanilla farming as a livelihood activity. In addition, GEC conducted refresher training on community nursery management, introduced *gelam* species, and implemented community awareness programmes on peatland conservation. To address recurring peat fires, GEC collaborated with Department of Environment and the Malaysia Pineapple Industry Board to conduct a pineapple waste management programme, and with Department of Irrigation and Drainage to construct canal blockings to raise peat water levels and support fire response preparedness.

Sabah

GEC participated in the Heart of Borneo (HoB) International Conference held on Oct 22–23, organised by the Forestry Department, which was attended by representatives from Malaysia, Brunei, and Indonesia, as well as NGOs, civil society organisations (CSOs), and other relevant stakeholders.

In addition, GEC CSR activities were implemented through a fire awareness campaign at Sekolah Kebangsaan Palu-Palu, in collaboration with the Beaufort District Forestry Department. As part of the CSR initiative, assistance was provided in the form of painting materials to refurbish the Pusat Pengumpulan Hasil Ladang Nenas Takuli, as well as equipment such as chairs, tables, and solar lights to improve facilities and infrastructure.



Sarawak

Under GEC CSR programme, GEC installed signboards and checkpoints along the Prayer Mountain trail (Kelabit Highland, Bario) in October to help hikers navigate their location along the trail. In collaboration with the Sarawak Forestry Corporation (SFC), GEC also assisted in a biodiversity assessment of frog species along the Community Eco-tourism Trail. The findings will be used to provide information for visitors and hikers through brochures and information boards installed along the trail. In December, GEC attended the Honorary Warden course organised by SFC, aimed at enhancing the knowledge and skills of rangers in wildlife conservation, particularly in the Bario district. The course was also attended by several local community members from Bario, strengthening collaboration between rangers and the community in wildlife conservation efforts.

Regional

GEC successfully secured a grant from ASEAN-UK Green Transition Fund to support translating AIF-HFSLM into national context in Cambodia and Lao PDR. Under this project, GEC in partnership with

GGGI has successfully conducted the first Stakeholder Meeting on National Investment Framework (NIF) for Lao PDR in Vientiane on Dec 22. The meeting was officiated by Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Environment together with a representative from British Embassy in Lao PDR and was attended by more than 40 representatives from multi-sector to share insights on priorities and possible collaborations to support haze-free sustainable land management.

The EnCORE Wetlands Project supported the Experiential Learning Exchange (ELP) led by the ASEAN Centre for Biodiversity (ACB) held from Nov 3-6 involving 27 delegates from NRES, ACB, and ASEAN Member States. In addition, the Second Carbon Stock and Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Assessment Mission was conducted on Nov 27 to Dec 5 in Agusan Marsh, Philippines, building on the initial assessment carried out in September 2025. Progress was also made on initiated the development of a regional toolkit for estimating peatland carbon stocks and emission levels in the ASEAN region, including an initial coordination meeting with experts from the United Kingdom and Vietnam.



Yayasan Gambut

On Oct 29, Yayasan Gambut conducted a Liberica coffee maintenance training in Temiang Village, Bengkalis District, involved 50 members of the Makmur Jaya Women Farmers Group (47 women and 3 men). The Liberica coffee agroforestry planting began on Oct 14 in Temiang Village, Bengkalis District, led by women farmers from Kelompok Tani Wanita Makmur Jaya. A total of 1,200 coffee seedlings were planted within smallholder oil palm plantations on peatland. The strong involvement of women farmers highlights a gender-inclusive, scalable model that links peatland restoration with sustainable livelihood development.



In December 2025, Yayasan Gambut developed a manual entitled “Liberica Coffee Cultivation Manual for Peatland Ecosystems” based on Yayasan Gambut’s field experience in promoting Liberica coffee as a peat-compatible livelihood in Bengkalis and Siak Districts. The publication serves as a practical guide for farmers and programme implementers, covering agroforestry-based cultivation practices, peatland management, and fire risk reduction. The preparation of this manual contributes to strengthening programme sustainability and supports the replication of peat-friendly livelihood approaches beyond the reporting period. With the support of the Pan Pacific Conservation Foundation (PPCF), Yayasan Gambut organised a Liberica Coffee Agroforestry Training on Peatlands on 19 December 2025, at the Pematang Duku Village Hall, Bengkalis Sub-district. The training was attended by 50 participants (13 women and 37 men).

Between Dec 6-10, Yayasan Gambut completed the installation of three Fire Danger Rating System (FDRS) units in Pematang Duku Village, Bengkalis District. On Nov 25, the Government of Bengkalis officially launched the “Bengkalis Lestari” initiative, a strategic programme aimed at promoting climate-resilient, prosperous, and environmentally sustainable regional development. The programme was officially inaugurated by the Regent of Bengkalis, Ms. Kasmarni and attended by representatives from the Ministry of Environment and Forestry and the Environmental Fund Management Agency (BPDLH). Following the launch, Yayasan Gambut supported the initiative by facilitating a mangrove planting activity in Kelapa Pati Village, Bengkalis District, where 200 Rhizophora mangrove seedlings were planted in the coastal mangrove tourism area.



Outreach & Partnership Programme

Zainudin Ismail GEC Community Impact Grant Award Presentation

The two grantees for the inaugural cycle of Zainudin Ismail GEC Community Impact Grant (ZIGCIG) were presented with the RM20,000 grant each at a ceremony at Pusat Informasi Sungai Penchala, Petaling Jaya on 2 October 2025. Kawasan Rukun Tetangga Sungai Terap (Perak) and Pertubuhan Sahabat Hutan Bakau Kampung Dato' Hormat (Selangor) who were selected from 21 applicants, shared their inspiring success stories during a mini-exhibition.



UNFCCC COP30

GEC showcased some of their best practices and shared valuable insights at the global platform of the 2025 United Nations (UN) Framework Convention on Climate Change Conference of Parties (COP30) at Belem in Brazil (November). GEC director, Mr Faizal Parish, who is also Chair for Global Environment Facility Civil Society Organisation (GEF-CSO) Network represented GEC and the Network at these events.

At COP30, GEC took on a lead role in four side events with partner organisations:

Other High-Level GEF-CSO engagement sessions

GEF Consultation with CSOs (Dec 12): Mr Parish participated in the dialogue on progress toward the ninth replenishment cycle (GEF-9) and to consider how a whole-of-society approach can be embedded across GEF-9.

70th GEF Council Meeting (Dec 15-19): Mr Parish led the GEF-CSO Network in making statements highlighting the Network's concerns and deliberations on various matters discussed at the week-long 70th GEF Council Meeting. The Network's inputs were well received and noted by GEF.

Visibility

There were 34 media coverages on GEC between October and December 2025 (FCP: 9, RCP: 6, General: 19). These coverages had a total PR value of more than RM874,161.

Local heroes lead green change with GEC grants

Sabak Bernam, Batu Gajah groups receive RM20,000 each to restore mangroves and beautify rivers



Two grassroots organisations from Sabak and Terengganu have each received RM20,000 to carry out community-based environmental projects under a new initiative by the Global Environment Centre (GEC).

The initiative, known as the Sabak and Terengganu GEC Community Impact Grant (GEC-CIG), was launched in April this year to support local groups involved in environmental restoration and sustainable resource management.

The two groups are Persekitaran Melayu Sabak (PMS) and the Sabak and Terengganu GEC Community Impact Grant (GEC-CIG). PMS said the two groups were selected from among 21 proposals from Malaysia and Indonesia. Following a detailed evaluation by the centre's secretary and advisory committee.

GEC will use the funds to restore degraded mangrove areas by planting 1,000 mangrove trees and carrying out community-based local conservation to tackle coastal and riverbank erosion. Meanwhile, STG plans to adopt and enhance a section of the Sungai Terengganu riverbank through tree-planting and beautification activities, a community garden project, composting, recycling and river monitoring efforts.

GEC advisory committee chairman Frank Chan Chee Hock said the grant was designed to help active community groups start or expand their local environmental initiatives.

"The two selected projects focus on mangrove and river ecosystems, both vital for sustainable people and nature," he said.

"Mangroves act as a natural coastal buffer and provide breeding grounds for marine life, while river supply water, food and livelihoods."

"The grant provides a much-needed boost to the local community to care for their environment," said Hock.

300 volunteers spruce up PJ housing scheme

TO MARK Hari Cuci Malaysia (National Cleanup Day) and World Rivers Day, 300 volunteers came together to spruce up PPR Lembah Subang 1 public housing scheme in Petaling Jaya.

It was organised by OSK Foundation in collaboration with the Global Environment Centre (GEC), Petaling Jaya City Council (MBPJ), Housing and Local Government Ministry (KPKT), Petaling District Department of Irrigation and Drainage (DID Petaling) and the PPR Lembah Subang 1 neighbourhood group (KRT).

It saw the participation of the community, OSK Group employees, government agency and non-governmental organisation (NGO) representatives.

The cleanup involved the drains, a park and carpark, the painting of a mural and railings, as well as waste separation, all aimed at promoting a cleaner, healthier and sustainable environment.

Carbon tax shows govt serious on tackling climate change

KUALA LUMPUR: The implementation of the carbon tax, set to begin next year, demonstrates the government's firm commitment to addressing climate change in a sustainable and holistic way, reinforcing the nation's transition towards a green economy.

Climatologist Prof Dr Fredolin Tanggang said the initiative is in line with Malaysia's target of reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emission intensity by 45 per cent by 2030, in accordance with its international commitments.

"To date, more than 40 countries have implemented a carbon tax mechanism. Malaysia appears to be on the right track with the introduction of policies such as the National Energy Transition Roadmap (NETR) and the New Industrial Master Plan 2030 (NIMP 2030)," he told Bernama.

When tabling Budget 2026 last week, Prime Minister Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim announced that the government will be introducing the tax starting with the iron, steel and energy sectors.

To ensure the efficient implementation of the carbon tax, he said its mechanism would be aligned with the forthcoming National Carbon Market Policy and the National Climate Change Bill.

Meanwhile, Global Environment Centre (GEC) Rivers Care Programme manager Dr K. Kalithasan said the carbon tax would help sustain environmental conservation efforts, in line with previous green initiatives such as combating uncontrolled logging to protect the nation's forest ecosystems.

"The protection of our natural heritage is crucial not only now but also for the future, and this requires substantial funding."

"We support this initiative and hope it will be implemented consistently and comprehensively, as it affects not only the environment but also human life," he said, Bernama.
