

## QUARTERLY UPDATE (JANUARY TO MARCH 2026)

This report provides updates on the progress of GEC's activities for the first quarter (Q1) of 2026: January to March 2026.

### FOREST & COASTAL PROGRAMME

#### 1. Ecosystem Restoration and Site Management

- GEC planted 5,814 trees across degraded peatland and mangrove ecosystems.
- Peatland restoration: 5,160 trees planted—4,800 trees in Raja Musa Forest Reserve (FC 23 & FC 43) and 360 trees in Gunung Arong Forest Reserve (FC 103)—with Prosper Capital Holdings Sdn. Bhd. and Tabung Haji Plantations.
- Mangrove restoration: 654 trees planted at Kampung Tenglu Laut (Johor) with UNIQLO Malaysia.
- Friends of Mangrove conducted growth monitoring and maintenance at multiple sites (Perak, Selangor, Kedah, Johor), achieving 80–90% survival rates with Yayasan Sime Darby support.
- Three canal block units at FC 23/FC 43 (RMFR) remained functional after the Northeast Monsoon; minor issues were identified and maintenance is scheduled for completion by April 2026.



#### 2. Environmental Education and Outreach

- District Education Office coordination in Manjung and Kerian (Perak) and Kuala Muda (Kedah) secured at least five schools for the district Mangrove Awareness & Education Carnival (April 2026).
- Proposals for Mangrove Forest Ranger (MFR) and Peatland Forest Ranger (PFR) carnivals were approved by the Selangor State Education Department for implementation in Q2–Q3 2026.
- Monash Global Immersion Guarantee (GIG) Block 3 (Jan 6–8) engaged 110 students and staff through visits and briefings at GEC-CoSPeC, RMFR and the Temuan Culture



Information Centre (TCIC), strengthening understanding of peatland restoration and community-based management.

- A public exhibition at Kampung Hubong, Endau (Johor) on Jan 7 used interactive displays to raise awareness of peatland and mangrove conservation.
- Two video production contracts were signed

with Nuvista Media Sdn. Bhd. (Yayasan Sime Darby Phase 2; Aramco Phase 2 ecotourism). Filming is planned for May–June 2026 across six locations in Kedah, Perak, Selangor and Johor.

### 3. Community-Based Initiatives and Livelihoods

- FRIM visited the KompAS community nursery (Kampung Triang, Mersing) on Jan 3 to review practices and explore rare seed exchange. A donation of 800 dipterocarp seeds was made to the community who successfully germinated them and will use them to support Phase 2 planting.
- An arts-based upcycling sharing session (16 Jan 2026) with the British Council and Shaq Koyok involved 26 community members from Pulau Kempas and Bukit Cheeding to address waste issues and develop value-added handicrafts.
- A 150m long wave breaker at Kampung Tenglu Laut was upgraded using mangrove poles to improve wave resistance (using a four-layer design) and enhance stability and sediment accumulation.
- Interpretive infrastructure expanded: 2 bilingual signages at the Jus Water Reservoir planting site (with SMART and HSBC Bank Malaysia Berhad support), plus 77 bilingual signages/signboards across TCIC, Kampung Orang Asli Pulau Kempas, the MTB trail and access roads under the Indigenous Village Tourism Package (IVTP).
- Outreach materials were strengthened: 2,000 TCIC–IVTP booklets produced and distributed.
- SGAT facilitated 10 IVTP programmes/visits/exhibitions, generating RM 28,419 in quarterly sales from allowances, services and community products (handicrafts and vegetables).



#### 4. Conservation, Recognition and Partnerships

- YSD SEPAKAT community training (Jan 2026 14–16 in Johor) engaged 60+ participants including leaders from 12 PA/PPR communities in Zon Bandar Tun Razak (P124) and representatives from YB Dato' Seri Dr. Wan Azizah's office, SHBPTS and Yayasan Sime Darby.
- Two scientific papers from the 2024 Gunung Arong Forest Reserve Scientific Expedition were prepared and submitted for publication, supporting biodiversity documentation and knowledge sharing.
- GEC received the Mersing Sustainability Achievement Special Award on 20 Jan 2026 - recognising peatland restoration, mangrove rehabilitation and local partnerships (district office, THP, UNIQLO, Kompas and communities).
- GEC contributed to the Forest Landscape Restoration Stakeholder Engagement Workshop (Feb 5–6) to inform FLR planning (2026–2030) and support Malaysia Greening Programme 2.0.
- UNIQLO–GEC Phase 2 launched on Feb 2026 at Taman Tugu: a three-year initiative (2026–2028) to expand mangrove restoration in Mersing and showcase Phase 1 achievements.



#### 5. Policies and Guidelines (Selangor Peatlands)

- Five stakeholder engagement meetings were held with IADA Barat Laut Selangor, PLANMalaysia Selangor, Majlis Perbandaran Hulu Selangor, Department of Environment Selangor and the Forestry Department of Peninsular Malaysia to gather inputs and data for the State Action plan on Peatlands (SAPP) Selangor 2026–2035.
- On Feb 12, GEC contributed to a financing workshop to identify policy and institutional gaps and recommend mechanisms such as Payment for Ecosystem Services (PES), Public–Private Partnerships (PPP), green investments and carbon credits for sustainable peatland financing.
- A multi-stakeholder FGD workshop (Feb 26–27 in Klang) with SSFD and SMPPEM Selangor brought together 56 stakeholders from 29 agencies to develop an integrated action plan covering about 172,480 ha of peatland.
- On Mar 9, GEC presented IMP-NSPSF 2025–2034, IMP-SSPSF 2025–2034 and SAPP Selangor progress during the SMPPEM IFAD Supervision Mission (SPMO Selangor).



## **OUTREACH & PARTNERSHIP PROGRAMME**

### **1) Global Environment Facility-Civil Society Organisation (GEF-CSO) Network**

#### **a) Re-election as GEF-CSO Network Chair**

GEC Director Mr Faizal Parish was re-elected as the GEF-CSO Network Chair for the second consecutive, two-year term commencing in Jan 2026. Some of the achievements in the first term of office include: leading delegations to five key global meetings and platforms, securing funding for GEF Secretariat for the Network, Membership Sub Committee, and Communications (Website Development). He provided key administrative and secretariat support to the Network which paved the way for more meaningful engagement within the Network, with GEF Secretariat and at the GEF Assembly and other CSO networks globally.



#### **b) GEF Replenishment Meeting in Bonn, Germany**

The incumbent GEF-CSO Chair, together with vice-chair Mr Sagar Aryal represented the Network at the Third GEF Replenishment Meeting (Jan 19-20) which brought together donor and recipient governments, partner agencies, and key stakeholders to advance negotiations on the ninth cycle of funding for the GEF Trust Fund. This meeting was a critical milestone in the multi-stage replenishment process that will determine the level of resources, strategic priorities, and frameworks for the GEF-9 period, which will support environmental action from July 2026 to June 2030. This meeting comes at a pivotal moment for achieving the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals, responding to heightened climate pressures, and expanding support for locally led and inclusive conservation initiatives. The outcomes of the Bonn meeting will influence how GEF mobilises and allocates resources to support transformative environmental solutions in diverse contexts — including community-driven action, gender-responsive programming, Indigenous and local community engagement, and interventions that tackle pollution and biodiversity decline. The Network was very active in the negotiations with the participating donor countries strongly encouraging them to include key recognition and resource allocation for Indigenous peoples and local communities, CSOs, women and youth in the policies for GEF 9. The Network presented six statements on amongst others, policy and programming directions, programming scenarios and global environmental benefits targets, financial considerations for GEF-9 Replenishment and GEF-9 Draft Summary of Negotiations.

### **2) GEC's new Corporate Video**

Together with Nuvista Media, GEC produced its latest Corporate Video highlighting GEC's ongoing role and work, aspirations for 2050. This included onsite interviews and video shoot with GEC Chair, Directors and Programme Managers, alongside stakeholders such as community leaders and volunteers, with ancillary support from various programme teams in December 2025, and the editing and post-production was completed, approved and uploaded to Youtube by March 2026. ### 3) YP Plantations Holdings Sdn Bhd video

To highlight the overall success and milestones of the completed 4000ha recovery project in and adjacent to the Pekan Forest Reserve in Pahang, GEC assisted Yayasan Pahang Plantation Holdings Sdn Bhd (YPPH) to produce a short video on the project which was completed in March, for the closing event for the project scheduled in April. This video highlights the impact of the project at the site and for the local community. The video includes interviews with the company CEO, GEC director, and two YPPH plantation managers who were leading the project onsite as well showcasing the role and work of the local communities, while highlighting the impact of the project to these same communities. ### 5) Environment Education Programme for Veolia Water Technologies staff

As part of its Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) programme, 76 staff members from Veolia Water Technologies participated in a half-day volunteering activity on Feb 11 organised by GEC at Kampung Orang Asli Bukit Lagong. The initiative supports a community-based food security programme led by Yayasan Hasanah, the Ministry of Finance (MoF), and the Global Environment Centre (GEC), aimed at strengthening livelihoods within the Orang Asli Bukit Lagong community. Volunteers from Malaysia, Singapore, Thailand, Vietnam, the Philippines, as well as Veolia's global and APAC offices, contributed to cleaning and weeding the community garden and forest nursery, and maintaining the aquaponic system. Participants also took part in a river education session, where they learned about river health monitoring and water quality testing. The programme concluded with participants gaining a deeper understanding of the community's efforts towards food security and an enhanced sense of environmental stewardship, particularly in relation to river conservation.



## PEATLAND PROGRAMME

### PAHANG

- State Action Plan for Peatlands (SAPP): GEC concentrated on developing the Pahang SAPP through intensive stakeholder engagement to define priority issues, challenges and data needs. A multi-stakeholder Focus Group Discussion on Jan 13 convened 86 participants from across Pahang, followed by targeted consultations with key district and state agencies to refine inputs. Field assessments in the Cameron Highlands and the Tasek Bera RAMSAR site supported data validation and strengthened the evidence base for the plan.
- Fire prevention & response in SEPPL: Community-based fire monitoring continued across the Southeast Pahang Peatland Landscape (SEPPL) with 18 community patrollers conducting routine surveillance and reporting. GEC also worked with the Fire and Rescue Department (Bomba) to support fire monitoring using both ground and aerial approaches.
- Post-incident coordination (Cenderawasih): After a fire incident in Cenderawasih, GEC joined the Pekan Land and District Office and other stakeholders to discuss actions to stop the community practice of burning pineapple waste to prepare farms for replanting.
- Community welfare & livelihoods: Building on 2025 support, GEC continued follow-up on the distribution of 52 solar light sets and 20 water filter sets to improve household welfare. Livelihood monitoring continued for community activities such as vegetable and vanilla farming. On Mar 31, GEC delivered a Biodiversity Field Assistant Course to strengthen local capacity for biodiversity monitoring.



### SABAH

- Field activities were limited in Jan–Feb due to frequent flooding, but monitoring was sustained through community patrollers to maintain presence and oversight in target areas.
- Pilot sago planting preparation: Site surveys were completed at several strategic locations, including forest reserve areas, to assess suitability and inform planning and implementation for the next phase of the pilot sago planting project.
- Institutional partnership: On Mar 10, GEC met the Sabah Forestry Department (Deputy Chief Conservator of Forests) in Sandakan to review MoU progress and present the project pipeline. Both parties showed strong commitment; the MoU is expected to be formalised by mid-2026.

**SARAWAK**

- Kelabit Highlands coordination: Engagement sessions with Sarawak Forestry Corporation (SFC) and the Department of Agriculture (DOA) aligned 2026 activity plans and explored opportunities for future joint ventures.
- Community-based initiatives: Discussions continued with Kampung Ramudu on implementing the Tagang programme as a pilot. Routine maintenance was carried out by the Penan community, including upkeep of pantu palm planting areas and the community eco-tourism trail. Further planning and coordination are expected to be finalised in Q2 2026.
- Sarawak SAPP leadership: GEC was appointed lead consultant for preparation of the Sarawak SAPP. In Q1, engagements were held with partners including WWF and the Ministry of Natural Resources and Urban Development (MUDeNR) to shape the strategy and overall approach. A draft Inception Report was submitted to MUDeNR as an initial framework; the first workshop is scheduled for April.
- SAGU project start-up: The Western Pacific Sustainable Peatland Management (SAGU) project officially commenced and is in inception. Implementation is expected in H2 2026 for Sabah (KPPL) and Sarawak (Kelabit Highlands, Bario and Maludam Landscape).



**REGIONAL (ASEAN)**

- Advancing AIF-HFSLM: GEC and the Global Green Growth Institute (GGGI) continued implementing the ASEAN Investment Framework for Haze-Free Sustainable Land Management (AIF-HFSLM) under the ASEAN-UK Green Transition Fund. Activities included a regional workshop and national meetings to support translation of the AIF into National Investment



Frameworks (NIFs) and to share lessons on accessing climate and biodiversity finance. These engagements convened ASEAN Member States (AMS),



development partners and financial institutions and helped surface project ideas to support AIF-HFSLM delivery.

- ASEAN coordination: GEC facilitated ASEAN processes including the Fourth Ad-hoc Task Force on AIF-HFSLM (4th ATA) on 28<sup>th</sup> January, where the AIF-HFSLM Implementation Plan was discussed to support adoption by member countries before submission to COM AATHP for endorsement.
- Country support (Cambodia & Lao PDR): With GGGI, GEC supported preparation of country-tailored Investment Frameworks. Cambodia held two consultative workshops (Jan and Mar 2026); Lao PDR held its second consultative meeting in March. Two Investment Framework documents were prepared to guide strategies for mobilising resources to prevent haze and improve air quality.
- Nature-based Solutions & climate finance: In Feb 2026, GEC and AIF-HFSLM advisory members supported the ASEAN Regional Dialogue on Advancing Nature-based Solutions (NbS) for Climate Action in Jakarta (ALAM project). The session strengthened AMS understanding of climate finance access and Green Climate Fund (GCF) proposal development.
- EnCORE Wetlands carbon toolkit: Under the same funder (ASEAN-UK Green Transition Fund), GEC organised a workshop (March 3-5 in Putrajaya) to develop a Toolkit for estimating carbon stocks and emission levels in ASEAN peatlands. The workshop involved 50+ participants including experts; it was officiated by Ts. Dr. Khairul Naim bin Adham (NRES) and closed by Dr. Jerome L. Montemayor (ASEAN Centre for Biodiversity)

#### YAYASAN GAMBUT (RIAU, INDONESIA)

- Livelihoods and enterprise development: In January to March, Yayasan Gambut strengthened sustainable livelihoods, institutional capacity and community-based peatland/social forestry management in Riau. In January, a community-based non-timber forest product (NTFP) enterprise was established in Pematang Duku Village, Bengkalis. A coffee pulping machine was handed over to Kelompok Tani Ketiau Jaya to enhance Liberica coffee post-harvest processing. A market partnership was formalised via MoU with an off-taker, strengthening market access and incentives for peat-friendly agroforestry.
- Capacity building in social forestry (HKm): From February to March 2026, under the Pertamina CSR programme in the HKm area of Siarang Arang Village, Rokan Hilir, trainings covered sustainable aquaculture (baung catfish), cassava processing (gaplek), smoked fish processing, compost production, institutional strengthening and forest monitoring. Sessions engaged 35–53 participants and improved technical skills, governance systems and value-added production.

- Knowledge product: A community-based peatland management guidebook documenting practical experiences and good practices from Pematang Duku Village was completed and finalised for printing in Mar 2026, serving as a reference for restoration, fire prevention and sustainable livelihood development.

## RIVER CARE PROGRAMME

### 1. W.A.T.E.R Project

- Klang River Basin: Strengthened community infrastructure and increased youth participation through engagement activities at the Sg Way River Cabin.
- Operational delivery included extensive plant cataloguing at the Sg Way Information Centre, wetland initiatives and routine maintenance along the company trail, and support for a high-profile media visit to garden and riverbank sites.
- Weekly planting sessions at the Sg Way Cabin and Block 3 were sustained through regular coordination to maintain consistent community involvement.
- Selangor River Basin: Sustained monitoring and beautification at Rantau Panjang and Taman Suria community sites.



- Completed site audits and maintenance for the Sg Selangor Rain Water Harvesting (RWH) system, alongside ongoing riverbank planting and weekly beautification updates.



- Supported community-led economic activity through pickle production using garden harvests, reinforcing social enterprise goals alongside greening efforts.

### 2. Sungai Kayu Ara River Protection Project

- Quarterly river monitoring (24 Jan 2026): Conducted with PPR Lembah Subang 1 community members at Sungai Kayu Ara, involving 12 participants from the local community and river supporters.
- Organised by Friends of Sungai Kayu Ara (SUKA) under the GEC–OSK Foundation project, continuing three-monthly monitoring using the RIVER Ranger 2.0 citizen science programme.
- Participants assessed two sampling points (monsoon drain and river), carried out hands-on



river health assessments with GEC guidance, and strengthened biodiversity monitoring using datasheets/guidebooks and iNaturalist for digital data collection and species identification.

- Programme planning discussions explored ways to strengthen implementation and introduce new green initiatives for the PPR community, reflecting growing readiness for community ownership and a more resilient monitoring network.
- SMART Ranger Talk (17 Mar 2026): Delivered at SMK Lembah Subang, engaging 100 Form 3–4 students and 7 teachers.



- The session combined interactive modules on solid waste and waste management (including the 4R2C concept and action planning) with practical demonstrations on recycling art, composting, eco-enzyme production, and water conservation—supporting adoption of sustainable habits in school and community.

### 3. Rehabilitation of Taman Aman Lake Project

- Quarterly LAKE Ranger monitoring (25 Jan 2026): Implemented at Taman Aman Lake, Petaling Jaya as the first quarterly session of the year.
- Implemented by GEC with Google Global and Bonneville Environmental Foundation (BEF), involving Friends of Taman Aman Lake (FOTA), MAZ International School and other community groups, with support from local representatives.
- Participants conducted water quality testing and biodiversity observations using LAKE Ranger citizen science methods, datasheets and reference materials, and iNaturalist for digital data collection and species identification.
- Discussions covered future lake treatment and rehabilitation options and the design of a community-focused lake education programme, strengthening long-term stewardship.



### 4. SER–Microsoft Ecological Restoration Project (Cyberjaya)

- World Wetlands Day-themed event (7 Feb 2026): Educational and volunteering programme at Cyberjaya Lake Gardens under the Cyberjaya Lake Gardens Ecological Restoration Project.
- A collaboration between GEC and Majlis Perbandaran Sepang, with support from the Society of Ecological Restoration (SER) and Microsoft.
- Participants joined the Cyberjaya Educational Walk across ten nature stations and learned about

lake health monitoring via LAKE Ranger, wetland planting, weeding along the pollination garden, and biodiversity observation.

- The event provided meaningful outdoor learning and strengthened participant stewardship, particularly for wetlands and urban nature.

### 5. Empowering Communities to Enhance Livelihood & Food Security (Yayasan Hasanah)

Jok Maduh D’Kenang launch (5 Feb 2026, Sungai Siput, Perak): A new Temiar community-based ecotourism destination in Kampung Kenang was officially launched during a half-day

ceremony aligned with Visit Malaysia 2026, attended by 150+ participants from government agencies, NGOs, private sector, local communities and nearby Orang Asli villages.

- The destination offers riverfront chalets, picnic areas and swimming spots along the Korbu River, and cultural experiences (traditional food and demonstrations), supporting cultural heritage and sustainable livelihoods.

- The initiative is a milestone of the ‘Empowering Communities to Enhance Livelihood through Ecotourism and Food Security’ project (March 2024–February 2026), implemented by GEC with Yayasan Hasanah and the Ministry of Finance in partnership with JAKOA and DID Perak; March 2026 marked successful project close-out.



proposal to expand ecotourism initiatives at Jok Maduh D’Kenang and Jok Bepihoy Mabeg (Kampung Makmur), and to explore additional expansion sites recommended by JAKOA.

- JAKOA Director General visit (6 Mar 2026): Site engagement in Dewan Ta Rayak with 35 participants from JAKOA, GEC and the community, including a cooperative briefing, project presentation, Q&A on strengthening governance and sustainability, and a guided tour of facilities (management hut, chalets, eco shop and product area).
- Continuity planning: Following successful completion, the RCP team is developing a new

## 6. Sungai Johor Water Conservation and Stewardship Project

- The project supports a water balancing programme in the Johor River Basin, aligned with Meta’s goal to replenish 100% of the water used in its Singapore data centres by 2030. Phase 1 focuses on a Rapid Environmental Assessment: assessment activities have begun and are ongoing. The team has engaged IPASA and Universiti Teknologi Malaysia (UTM) to explore collaboration as study partners, particularly to strengthen water quality components.

## 7. River Health Index (RHI) & Community-based IRBM for River Health Care (Sungai Kinta Catchment)

- Funded by Yayasan Hasanah and the Ministry of Finance, the project aims to strengthen river basin management and stewardship in the Sungai Kinta Catchment by promoting River Health Index (RHI) use, supporting community action, and sustaining the CbKRB–IRBM model.
- The 18-month project until Aug 2027 commenced in March with stakeholder consultations and latest on-ground data collection actively underway to establish an evidence base for implementation.
